Meroney's has a beef production SAE that steamed from his placement experience on his family farm. He started his herd with 3 Angus heifers and today he has 16 cows, 11 feedlot steers/heifers, 4 replacement heifers, and 2 breeder bulls. Meroney focuses a lot of his time in his SAE on improving herd health and genetics. Meroney has been a very active FFA member and is currently serving as the Chapter President.

This named honor is a part of a larger awards program called the Indiana State Stars. Members determined as District and Section Stars then are interview for a chance to be named as State Star in these four prestigious awards: Star Farmer, Star Placement, Star Agribusiness and Agriscience. Meroney will find out if he is the next State Star on Wednesday, June 15, 2016 at 7 pm in the Hoosier Degree Session during the 87th Indiana State FFA Convention at Purdue University.
